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GLOSSARY

- **Crowdfunding:** The crowdfunding (The microfinance) allows the start-up and development of a business through the relatively small investments provided by many people when it is difficult to access other forms of financing or those that contain very high costs.
- **Fundraising:** It is the activity of attracting resources carried out by the various nonprofit entities, as they are; ONGs, foundations, associations or different groups. To be able to carry out their projects.
- **Co- financing:** Complementary financial instrument to support with non-refundable resources.
- **Official Development Assistance:** It is defined as the flow provided by official agencies (state, local governments, among others).
- **Donations in kind:** They are those contributions that, instead of providing cash, provide goods or services.
- **Sustainable development:** It is understood as that economic progress that includes variables, objectives and needs of a social and environmental nature, to maintain a balance between improving the living conditions of current populations and preserving the natural resources and ecosystem services on which the well-being of future generations depends.
- **Regional integration:** This can occur between countries or among the different territorial authorities of the same country.
- **Vertical integration:** It occurs when the same company takes over activities that it has traditionally delegated to third parties.

INTRODUCTION

International cooperation was developed after World War II with some important events that occurred over time such as Europe's reconstruction plans, the emergence of the United Nations system and the decolonization process, among others.

Collaboration between different nations in the perspective of the passing of time was understood only as direct transmission of monetary resources to a receiver to improve and boost the different development indicators. This conception went through a crisis that was caused by the poor results that have been presented for more than three decades.

Currently, cooperation is regarded as a perspective of human development, which surpasses the economist and vertical vision of previous periods. Likewise, international cooperation is made more flexible to adapt to the changing needs of the international environment, it can now be shown that over the decades the emergence of a system involving institutions and agencies that are focused on this objective, acquiring an important implication over time. International cooperation is seen as one of the tools that has generated the greatest importance in the impact to the world community, with the main objective of meeting certain needs that are vital and priority for a State that is composed of voluntary aid provided by one country to another to improve the various areas of interest in the international environment.

The world is increasingly globalized, where the main variable is international wellbeing since it depends on the overall stability of all countries.

This situation motivates society to promote the continued development aid of resource-poor countries and those seeking to help build the various conditions that are necessary for the most vulnerable populations. This is because they can generate benefits for the entire international community because both sides receive different benefits such as improvement in various variables represented as it is in health, democracy, community work, human rights, education, among others.

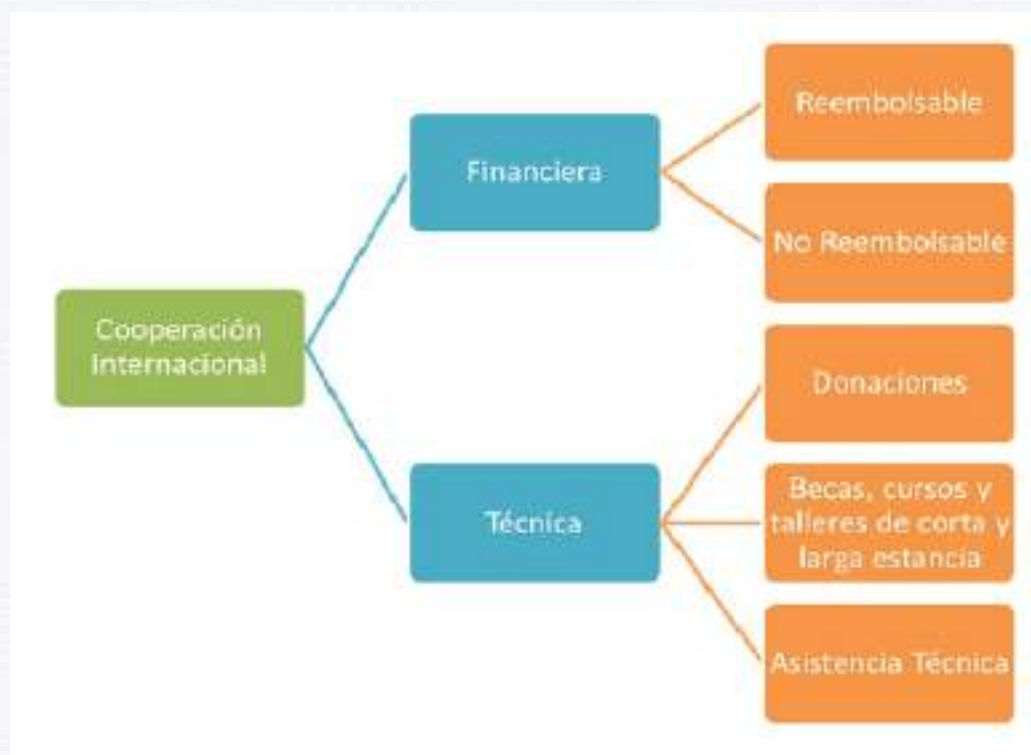
International cooperation is an issue of vital importance within the field of study of international societies and relations because certain important actors for the world such as states, international agencies and non-governmental organizations are involved in this area.
